

HISTORY OF THE HO-CHUNK NATION: *(courtesy of the Ho-Chunk Nation's Division of Cultural Resources)*

Greetings from the Ho-Chunk Nation Green Bay Branch Office located at 1047 9th Street. Thank you for allowing us in your homes via the MPNA Newsletter. The Ho-Chunk Nation (formerly known as the Wisconsin Winnebago) originated in the Brown/Door County area. In these next issue(s) of the newsletter, I will be submitting our timeline known as our history.

March 20, 2014 – 1st day of Spring: Ho-Chunks celebrates this time of year as our HAPPY NEW YEAR – as it's the Season that everything on God's creation begins/blooms anew.....

HISTORY Our origin stories state that our creation was at Moogasuc (Red Banks), near Green Bay. We have been in Wisconsin since the beginning and our story is one of a people who love the land of Wisconsin. In the last 200 years we have faced many hardships and overcome many obstacles to be here. **1620** – The first mention of Winnebago came to French through Huron and Ottawa middlemen, during the French's attempt to expand the fur trade. **1634** – French explorer, Jean Nicolet landed at the shores of Red Banks. This is the first recorded date of a meeting between the "white man" and the Winnebago. The exact size of our tribe was not historically documented at the time, however, our territory extended from Green Bay, beyond Lake Winnebago, to the Wisconsin River and to the Rock River in Illinois. **Late 1630's** -- Winnebago's went to war against the Michigan Algonquian tribes (the Foxes, Sacs, Potawatomie and Ottawa) who invaded Wisconsin from the present state of Michigan. Father Pierre Francis Xavier de Charlevoix, a Jesuit Missionary, estimated the Winnebago population at 4,500 – 5,000 warriors at the beginning of the hostility. A small pox epidemic reduced the number of Winnebago warriors to 1,500; dropping the Winnebago population by two-thirds. **1639-40** – Winnebago were attacked by the Illinois on Doty Island (present day Neenah, WI) in Lake Winnebago. **1643** – John Boissieu's map shows the Winnebago in villages on Lake Winnebago. **May 13, 1670** – Father Claude Allouez crossed the Bay (to the east side of the Bay in present Door County) to find "the Ovenibigoutz [Winnebago] in the clearing where they were assembling. **1718** – Winnebago villages moved to the Fox River and to Lake Winnebago. There are 600 Winnebago there. During the bloody warfare between the Winnebago and the French, Winnebago villages are burned by the French at Butte des Morts. **September 25-29, 1766** – Carver arrives at the great village of the Winnebago, located on a small island at the east end of Lake Winnebago (now the site of Menasha, WI). He says that the village contains about 50 lodges which house some 200 warriors. The total population estimate would be approximately 1,000 people. **September 25-29, 1766** – Carver meets Glory of the Morning, who receives him graciously and entertains him during the four days he remains at the village. He reports that the Winnebago are raising large quantities of corn, squash, beans, pumpkins, watermelons, and tobacco at their Doty Island village. **May 18, 1816** – A treaty of Peace and Friendship is signed in St. Louis confirming an earlier agreement outline in 1804. This is the first of many treaties negotiated between the Winnebago Nation and the U.S. government. **June 1819** – Captain Henry Whiting made a trip from Green Bay to Prairie du Chien and notes Winnebago villages at Doty Island, at a spot on the west side of Lake Winnebago, about 7 miles from the outlet, at the confluence of the Fox and Mecan Rivers and one village on the Baraboo River "...not far from the Portage." **August 18, 1821** – Menominee and Winnebago hold land in common. The government negotiates a treaty only with the Menominee which grants the New York tribes a strip of land five miles wide crossing the Fox River at Little Chute. **1822** – The U.S. Government begins leasing lands in what is now southwestern Wisconsin to lead miners, thus creating a rush of white spectators and prospectors into what is Winnebago territory. The New York tribes come back to the Winnebago asking for a larger grant of land. The Winnebago refuse. Winnebago are now mining lead in the Lake Koshkonong area. 1824 – Henry Brevoort, agent at Green Bay Agency, reports the Winnebago census at 700 warriors, all on the upper Rock River. Koshkonong Village is called the "Great Village of the Winnebago."

SPRINGTIME ODDS & ENDS

As we emerge from our winter's hibernation to enjoy the change in weather, here are a few items to consider.

FIRE SAFETY

Did you know that smoke Alarms are available through the GB Fire Prevention program? Batteries are no longer given out. Instead, home owners can get a free smoke alarm installed by the Fire Prevention crew. One alarm is allowed for each level. If you have a basement, a first floor and a second floor, you would get three free smoke alarms which come with a ten-year battery. There are no income requirements either.

Three Criteria:

1. Home must have been built before 1992
2. Must be the home owner – no rental properties
3. No apartment buildings

Lt. Nick Craig will schedule an appointment for a fire inspection, and install the alarms. It takes about 15 minutes and these could be the most important 15 minutes of your life!! He is also available for speaking at your organization's meetings.

MANDATORY AUTOMATED TRASH COLLECTION IMPLEMENTATION

The city municipal department has gone to an automated trash collection system. This means you will be required to begin using city issued carts, along with new garbage, yard waste and bulk item pick up rules. The rollout is happening in phases throughout 2014. You will know it's your turn when you receive a large green cart in your driveway. Attached will be a "owners manual" that outlines when you you may begin using them. There is also a detailed Frequently Asked Question section on just about any question you may have about the changes. We suggest you read it carefully as there are new rules for yard waste, and bulk item pick ups. If you have any questions, please contact the City Public Works Department at 920-448-3535, 100 N. 

Message from the GBNLC board members

Hello neighbors! As you may or may not know all neighborhood associations are connected through the Green Bay Neighborhood Leadership Council (GBNLC). The GBNLC is a charitable organization that works to improve the quality of life in neighborhoods by empowering citizens working through their neighborhood associations. The GBNLC meets once a month and its members consist of the president or other designee of each neighborhood association, as well as other appointed members.

The GBNLC functions through private dollars. Every three years the GBNLC has a capital campaign to raise funds to empower the neighborhoods and the people in them. The last campaign was in 2009 and raised \$410,000. Well, it is time for another capital campaign! The goal for this campaign is \$500,000! Of the money raised from the campaign, almost 97% goes straight back to the neighborhoods; about 3% goes to neighborhood outreach staff. We need your help! This campaign will benefit you by providing for neighborhood development, crime and safety prevention, and leadership development. The operating grants, mini grants for special projects, neighborhood association signs, community service interns that work with GBPD and much more are funded through the private dollars.
